African American History is the study of the culture and history of people of African descent. This historical journey begins before the arrival of the first blacks in North America. We will study some of the culture, geographical features and history of the continent of Africa. We will examine how blacks who had been traded to the new world for food helped to transform this country socially, politically and economically. We will study the struggle for freedom equality and identity. We will consider other topics such as violence, political and institutional racism, the Great Migration, Harlem Renaissance and we will look at the current state of Black America.

Students will examine a variety of primary sources. Students will read novels and short stories to help them understand the time periods and issues studied. Music and films will be used to supplement the lectures and discussions. Students will write a reaction papers, do a power point presentation, oral history and write a term paper.
