KAP English 12 is a dual credit course which creates an awareness of both the cultural diversity and the threads which connect all humanity through an extensive examination of well established literary pieces. Contemporary models of literary criticism will be used to enhance understanding and appreciation of literature. There will be extensive outside reading and writing. The issues brought forth in the reading and discussion may be controversial at times. Also, the class will view movies which will complement and transcend literary selections, for example, Jane Campion's *Bright Star* and Francis Ford Coppolo's *Apocalypse Now*.

The following requirements must be met in order to receive dual credit from Kenyon College and English 12 at RVHS.

A. Payment of a \$120 administrative fee is due at the end of November (for Kenyon credit and transcript).

B. Complete six essays $(2 \ 1/2 - 5 \text{ pages})$ per semester and one research paper (10+ pages) per semester. All papers must be on time or credit will be denied by Kenyon.

C. Attend and critique two cultural events (one per semester).

D. Complete 2 independent analyses of novels and plays from a book list.

E. Successful completion of this class earns 5 quality points on your transcript at River View. The class is graded on a 10 point grading scale, 90-100=A, 80-89=B, etc.

F. A grade of at least B- must be earned in the class for credit from Kenyon.

G. Texts which the student may be required to purchase include the following: Jonathan Swift's *Gulliver's Travels* and Joseph Conrad's *Heart of Darkness*. Books will be available for purchase in the High School office.
