Students enrolled in the KAP program at John Marshall high school are combined in classrooms with non-KAP students enrolled in the traditional AP Government course. While all students (KAP and non-KAP) will use one of the course textbooks listed above, KAP students will have additional assignments using the supplemental reading materials provided by Kenyon College.

Government is defined as: those institutions and processes by which public policies are made for a society. *Politics* is connected to questions of who gets what, when and how. Throughout this course we will examine some of the following key concepts:

- Explain the foundation of the American Political System as outlined in the Declaration of Independence, the U.S. Constitution and the Federalists Papers.
- * Explain the role of elections, political parties, and interest groups.
- * Examine ways in which public officials acquire and lose their offices including: appointment, primary and general elections, recall and impeachment.
- * Examine the role of the Congressional Branch, learn how bills become law, analyze the impact of Congress on public policy and the political system.
- * Examine the relationship of the Federal Government and the States.
- * Examine the role and function of the Executive Branch, including the Cabinet, Federal Bureaucracy and Agencies.
- Examine the role and function of the Federal Courts. Trace key Supreme Court decisions and study how they impact public policy with a focus on Civil Rights and Civil Liberties.
- * Examine the history of the Courts with a focus on judicial activism and judicial restraint. Was Marbury vs Madison the first key example of judicial activism?
- * Examine various PAC's and Interest Groups and their impact or lack of impact on shaping public policy issues and voting behavior.
- * Examin policy making in regards to: Economy, Foreign Relations and Defense.
- * Analyze the effects of shortages, surpluses, government price controls, inflation, CPI, GDP and the Unemployment Rate.
- * Examine the history of Mass Media and how it impacts the political process and shaping of public policy.
